

Goring CE Primary School Update

Goring Primary School Working Group, Neighbourhood Plan and Parish Council progressing well on project for the future of the school

It is appreciated by the School that the importance of the School to the community has been recognised within the Neighbourhood Plan currently in consultation. It is also acknowledged that a specific land allocation cannot be made in this Plan. There is a desire, though, to enhance some of the wording within the Plan, before it is finalised and submitted to SODC, to better support future options

for the School. This was the key focus of a consultation meeting with the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group (NPSG) last week.

The meeting with the School Working Group, the NPSG and Parish Council representatives was very constructive, and all in the meeting felt that the concerns of the school were understood. Likewise, the NPSG was able to further explain the principles and approach taken in drafting the plan, as well as answer questions. In the end, there was a commitment by the Steering Group to review the points raised and to seek to find ways to enhance the Plan accordingly. Assuming that the revised Plan submitted to



SODC by GPC (after all consultation comments have been taken into account) adequately addresses the concerns discussed, the School Working Group committed to publicly encourage support for the Plan.

As background, the Goring-on-Thames Parish Council, at the Extraordinary Meeting held in September, decided to support the School to work through the process to get the best school facilities for Goring and at the same time, not to delay the current Neighbourhood Plan process but to include the school issues as a strategic project in the Neighbourhood Plan. This is evident in the draft Neighbourhood Plan currently in consultation.

Shortly after the Extraordinary meeting, a Working Group was formed by the School's Governors, and three Parish Councillors have been designated to provide the support. All has been going very well, with great strides being made to explore all options for the school and to work through the necessary process. The first major step - an objective, comprehensive feasibility study looking at the condition and expected life of the current school, as well as the potential for renovating or rebuilding the school on the existing site (with or without the Bourdillon Field) - is being commissioned. Funding for the study has been agreed, with approximately half from the Parish Council and half from the Diocese. It is expected that the results of the Feasibility Study will be reported end February/early March. From that point, the next steps will be considered and agreed and the outcome reported to parents and the whole village.

Streatley Allotments Tree-Trim Project



Streatley Allotment Society is a small organisation of 38 plotholders from our own and the neighbouring village of Goring who grow an assortment of vegetables, fruit and flowers on our village allotments. The allotment site borders our village meadow, the recreation ground, and the parish church and churchyard. Together these form the heart of our small community.

The allotments were created 5 years ago from what was weed and bramble covered waste ground, and everyone has worked hard to get it into an attractive and productive state. At the start we had some funding to help clear the site and put in fencing. From this bare beginning we have turned our plots into productive gardens. Communal efforts take care of most general maintenance and improvements to the site

One of our early projects was to replant the long hedgeline shared with the village meadow. This is now growing well and we keep it in trim. But a second major L-shaped border is formed by trees which affect all of the plots adjacent to it. We want to have this reduced in height and width to let the light in and allow those plots to flourish.

This is too big a project for us to tackle ourselves, and unfortunately the longer we leave it, the bigger and more expensive the job gets. We have had quotes to do the work, but they are all in excess of what we can raise through years of plot fees, which are our only income. Together with our reserves, £1,000 would pay for the entire border to be reduced to a height and width that we could maintain ourselves.

This is the last of the major establishment works that are needed on our allotment site, and we very much hope that we can be awarded the funds to allow us to complete it.
